THE CORNER STONE OF THE NEW HIGH SCHOOL WELL AND TRULY LAID

A Peaceful Scene on a Peaceful Day, Made Pleasant by the Attendance of Thousands---Sir Richard McBride, Premier of British Columbia, Attends.

The corner stone of Chilliwack's new high school was well and truly laid yesterday afternoon by Sir Richard McBride, premier of British Columbia, in the presence of fully two thousand of the citizens of the city and valley. Eight hundred of this number were children from the schools of the district of Chilliwack who, marshalled under their respective teachers, presented a very pretty sight indeed as they were formed up in solid square in front of the foundation of the massive building that is soon to become the future higher seat of learning for the rising generations of Chilliwack. This sight was further enhanced as they sang the Maple Leaf Forever and waved miniature Union Jacks and gave cheers for their premier and the others on the platform.

The laying of the corner stone of the high school may truly be counted one of the events in the history of Chilliwack. It marks the epoch from which the people of this valley may date their expansion into the world of higher education, and it was fittingly commemorated by the attendance of many of the men holding high positions in the gift of the Dominion and the Province. Among those attending and honored with positions on the platform were: Sir Richard McBride, premier of British Columbia: Mr. J. D. Taylor. Member of the House of Commons of Canada; Speaker Eberts, of the Provincial Legislature of British Columbia; Mr. Manson, M.P.P. for Dewdney; Mr. Gifford, M.P.P. for New Westminster; Mr. F. Mackenzie, M.P.P. for Delta; Mr. Pearson Shaw, M.P.P. for Kamloops; Mr. Fletcher, Government Agent for New Westminster; Mr. J. Cambridge, County Court Registrar; and Mr. Glover, Assistant General Manager of the B. C. Electric Railway Company, and Mr. Alan Purvis, Manager of Interurban lines of the B. C. E. R. Others on the platform consisted of members of the township and city school boards; members of the city and township councils; representatives of the high school staff and members of the press.

Chilliwack Progress, May 28, 1913 New High School is now Open



Following ten months of construction, teachers and pupils of Chilliwack High School traded their old building for their brand new one.

The new school is a substantially constructed, fire-proof, and modernly equipped building, situated in beautiful surroundings.

This new structure occupies a strategical and commanding position on the corner of Charles Street and Westminster Avenue.

The lot is a beautiful three and one-half acre block of the old Henry Kipp property, edged by a grove of cherry trees.

1939 Chilliwack Junior High in New Building Beside Senior High School



April 17, 8:30 Monday—school life began.

Fifteen minutes later the doors of the new \$53,000 junior high school swung open for the first time.

School authorities were satisfied with the re-establishment of 600 pupils.

Students shifted from one- to seven-room country school houses to the new 16-room school.

Almost 400 students attend classes at the junior high, with six Grade VIII classes and five Grade IX classes.

The entrance classes have 35 students; with 36 pupils in the five first-year classes.

Students Take Over High School

Trek of 875 book-laden students by foot from Chilliwack Junior-Senior High school across Yale road and along a walk to the new high school is etched indelibly in the minds of Principal Wilf Graham and his teaching staff.

They watched the migration at 8:30 a.m. Monday, the first day of school for students in district 33.

They are still talking about the horde of students with their desk clearings—text books, note books, pens, paper and bottles of ink that made the early morning trip from the old to new high schools.

The new high school, in comparison, looked more like a huge training unit with a city department store savor.

Inside a row of glass doors students found themselves at the uncrowded crossroads of the \$1/2 million dollar structure. Straight ahead lay the unfinished cafeteria, classrooms, training units such as the woodworking and agricultural sections of farm mechanics and home economics.

At an angle were lockers for each student past the stone wall, glassed-in shelves for trophies and cups that students hope to win, the school office with business departments and a highly polished counter, a "nerve center" for communication with any room, and more classrooms.

Buzzers, bells and loud speakers echoed through the building after school hours from 2:30 p.m. Monday as engineers synchronized the time clock and made other acoustic adjustments.

NERVE CENTER

Earlier, Principal Graham issued orders from the "nerve center" — a small room, partially glassed-in where a complete intercommunications office is housed with record equipment and a record player.

Bulletins can be beamed to any room in the school, also CBC school broadcasts or recorded music from a turntable with variable speeds.

Yet to be fully completed is the cafeteria, the home economics room and some classrooms where old-style desks are serving until the new ones are installed.
